



All American Boys (Jason Reynolds) Y Fic REY


Anger is a Gift (Marc Oshiro) Y Fic OSH


The Crossover (Kwame Alexander) Y Fic ALE

Fourteen-year-old twin basketball stars Josh and Jordan wrestle with highs and lows on and off the court as their father ignores his declining health




Dear Martin (Nic Stone) Y Fic STO


The Hate You Give (Angie Thomas) Y Fic THO


How It Went Down (Kekla Magoon) Y Fic MAG


Piecing Me Together (Renee Watson) Y Fic WAT


Sunrise Over Fallujah (Walter Dean Myers) Y Fic MYE

When Marvin Johnson's twin brother, Tyler, is shot and killed by a police officer, Marvin must fight injustice to learn the true meaning of freedom.





This graphic novel trilogy is a first-hand account of Congressman John Lewis' lifelong struggle for civil and human rights, meditating in the modern age on the distance traveled since the days of Jim Crow and segregation. Rooted in Lewis' personal story, it also reflects on the highs and lows of the broader civil rights movement.
